Behind the Scenes

Sometimes, the significance of events comes when they represent good news about things that did not happen. Three such events befell SIR El Dorado Branch 23 in the course of the year:

1-No Ma'ams in SIRs 23

SIR branches across California, particularly those in distress, began to murmur about opening their membership to women, as a means of reducing the thinning of their membership ranks. At a loss for how such a move would keep our branch true to its charter of providing social activities for men, branch leadership declined opportunities to jump aboard this particular bandwagon.

2-No Hike of Fees in 2023

Branch leadership, almost to its own surprise, was able to fend off the prevailing tendency to automatically raise dues and monthly luncheon fees at the end of the year. - APRIL: Nothing Lasts Forever Tupperware, a national tradition and institution, tumbled into bankruptcy, despite having experienced a brief resurgence during pandemic lockdown. But the rain finally stopped.
- MAY: A King Dethroned Budweiser, a once iconic beer, lost over 21% of its value and its standing as King of Beers after an ill-fated advertising campaign that marketed to a target demographic at the expense

of alienating its traditional, macho customer base, leading Bud's corporate parent to eventually admit to AP News that the promotion caused Bud Light sales to plunge in a consumer backlash.

• JUNE: One-Way Adventure

A Titanic tourism submarine, launching at great cost and fanfare, imploded off the coast of Newfoundland, claiming the lives of the tourist operation's president and four paying passengers. The world watched for word of survivors for five days, although investigators ultimately concluded the vessel imploded shortly after making its dive.

- JULY: Oh, a Good Life Tony Bennet, a multi-generational music icon, passed away shortly before his 97th birthday.
- AUGUST: From Burning Man to Churning Mud The Burning Man festival and increasingly expensive desert adventure in the Nevada desert turned into a mud bath, thanks to brutal torrential rains. This stranded 77,000 festival attendees, who expressed chagrin at being unable to set their ritual fires.
- SEPTEMBER: Who's Buying What? Public outcry started to converge around the mysterious purchase of large parcels of land in Solano County surrounding Travis AFB. Ultimately, it turned out that the buyers were not Chinese spies but Silicon Valley billionaires who plan to build a model city for new tech workers to be able to afford in the future. The secrecy behind the purchase was to keep property sellers from hiking selling price once realizing the wealth of the buyers.
- OCTOBER: Terror Strikes

The Palestine terror group Hamas carried out the most bloody carnage against Jews since the Holocaust, with atrocities made more horrifying when Israeli officials played for the global press unedited videos of rapes, slaughter, and infanticide against defenseless Israeli citizens as filmed by Hamas attackers themselves. For the price of an appetizer, they started offering customers to be slapped in the face by a waitress in a kimono. Move over sushi. Slap-e-tizers are the latest craze from the inscrutable East.
